

### Objectives

- Create a network of haemophilia across Benin with more than 150 primary healthcare professionals trained
- Increase haemophilia diagnosis rate from 6% to 12% by 2024
- Decrease risks associated with circumcision for children with haemophilia
- Expand national patient organisation's reach and activities
- Raise awareness and interest of health authorities on bleeding disorders

#### **Status**

- Training and empowerment of people with haemophilia and families in Kandi.
- 2 refrigerators purchased for the centres of Abomey and Porto Novo to improve factor storage conditions.
- Development of a video film in 6 languages to raise awareness among traditional therapists on haemophilia diagnosis and symptoms.
- Awareness-raising day organised for traditional therapists in Lokossa, Abomey, Parakou and Porto Novo to allow them to recognise the disease and identify warning signs thereby preventing deaths.

### **Objectives**

• Strengthen haemophilia care in Gaborone to improve haemophilia care and to establish a training hub in the capital

- Decentralise care and diagnosis to Francistown and Maun, decreasing distance to care and diagnosis by up to 1,000km
- Strengthen patient organisation and improve haemophilia awareness to increase diagnosis rate from 24% to 37%

- A physiotherapist from Gaborone underwent a 1-month specialised physiotherapist training at Kenyatta National Hospital in Kenya.
- The Botswana Inherited Bleeding Disorders Association (BIBDA) commemorated World Haemophilia Day 2024 to raise awareness of haemophilia.
- 3 representatives from BIBDA and a haematologist from Princess Marina Hospital attended a 4-day capacity building workshop in Cape Town, South Africa. The South African Haemophilia Foundation (SAHF) delivered a workshop to support BIBDA to build a stronger patient organisation and improve their leadership and advocacy programmes.
- BIBDA held a stakeholder meeting attended by representatives from the Ministry of
  Health and Welfare, non-communicable diseases department, Central Medical Stores,
  Botswana Medicines Regulatory Authority, Baylor, and representatives from the private
  hospitals. The purpose of the engagement was for BIBDA to cultivate a working
  relationship with the stakeholders and be able to advocate/lobby for the needs of the
  haemophilia community under one roof with one voice. This would also foster future
  collaborations.

### **Objectives**

- Raise haemophilia awareness to health authorities and general public
- Strengthen and increase population's access to haemophilia diagnosis, to reach a diagnosis rate of 9% by 2024
- Develop outreach haemophilia knowledge of at least 300 first contact healthcare professionals
- Ensure country-wide access to haemophilia treatment
- Empower the haemophilia community

#### Status

- Development and recording of TV and radiophonic spots on disease awareness.
- Training course delivered for medical staff and nurses in the health regions of Koudougou and Kaya.
- Development of an education tool called 'Boite à image' (the image box) intended to be used by community-based health staff in the regions to raise awareness of haemophilia among the population.
- Planning and procedure development for factor dispatchment to regional hospitals.
- With this project, NNHF is partnering with the Fondation Pierre Fabre to improve diagnosis and care of both haemophilia and sickle cell disease.

### **Objectives**

Improve haemophilia knowledge in 6 cities in the country

• Strengthen patient organisation's visibility and improve haemophilia knowledge of people with haemophilia and families

• Increase general haemophilia awareness of the public and authorities

Increase diagnosis rate from 4% to 8% and update registry data

#### **Achievements**

- With the aim of raising awareness of haemophilia among healthcare professionals, 282
  healthcare professionals including doctors, nurses, lab technicians, and
  physiotherapists from Korhogo, Yamoussoukro, Bouake, San Pedro, Daloa and Aboisso
  regions were trained to recognise the clinical signs of haemophilia, refer potential cases
  to the reference centre and manage emergencies.
- The patient organisation was strengthened through training of its members in strategic planning, media engagement, and advocacy. Additionally, the establishment of regional chapters in Yamoussoukro, Bouake, San Pedro, Daloa and Korhogo has resulted in appointing a focal point in each region, extending its reach, and improving coordination and communication among members. New chapters are also being empowered to have a more active role in the association. For instance, the Bouake chapter has taken charge of organising and hosting World Haemophilia Day 2024 activities.
- Thanks to the impactful awareness raising activities conducted among both the general population and healthcare professionals from 6 regions in Cote d'Ivoire, the country achieved a remarkable 100% increase in the diagnosis rate. As a result of their efforts, a total of 106 people living with haemophilia were successfully diagnosed, doubling the national diagnosis rate from 4% to 8%.
- Specialised training provided of one physiotherapist from Abidjan in Dakar with Dr Sebastien Lobet, who then cascaded his knowledge to 9 other physiotherapists.
- Thanks to the advocacy efforts led by the patient organisation and the medical team, haemophilia has been included in the non-communicable disease programme. As a result, the government has committed to procuring prophylaxis for 50 patients, with ongoing discussions being held to increase this number and cover all patients diagnosed with severe haemophilia A.

• Strengthen the capacity of the haemophilia patient organisation in rural areas

• Raise awareness amongst healthcare professionals in 6 regions of the Gambia

• Improve quality of diagnosis in the capital and increase diagnosis rate from 7% to 15%

### **Status**

 Patient organisation chapter in Mansa Konko was established with the help of healthcare professionals across the country.

- World Haemophilia Day was celebrated to raise awareness. The event was graced by Ministry of Health officials and healthcare professionals.
- A safe circumcision event was organised at the Edward Francis Small Teaching Hospital which was attended by trained doctors, nurses and lab technicians.
- The number of people with haemophilia has increased from 17 to a total of 28.

#### **Status**

• Organised two 3-day awareness caravans and a diagnosis day both in N'zérékoré and Kankan

• Purchase of reagents for diagnosis days in N'zérékoré and Kankan.

• 23 people newly diagnosed with haemophilia thanks to the caravans.

• 38 people with haemophilia benefitted from therapeutic educational sessions.

• 57 healthcare professionals were trained to improve haemophilia care.

• With this project, NNHF is partnering with the Fondation Pierre Fabre to improve diagnosis and care of both haemophilia and sickle cell disease.



Through the project activities the knowledge of people with haemophilia and their family members about the condition is improving.

### **Objectives**

- Leverage on the learnings and experiences from all four countries
- Improve access to blood disorders care infrastructure in all four countries by establishing/strengthening 7 centres in 3<sup>rd</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> level hospitals in Uganda and Rwanda and making basic care available in more than 30 primary care facilities across Kenya and Tanzania
- Increase diagnosis rate by equipping the centres and through awareness raising and screening activities (diagnosing 700 new persons with haemophilia)
- Create or upgrade national blood disorders registries in Uganda and Rwanda
- Empower the national patient organisations
- Build strategic alliances and advocate for improved care

### **Status updates**

#### Kenya

- Kenya Medical Training College (KMTC) and Kenya Haemophilia Association (KHA) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to collaborate on training and awareness creation on haemophilia and other bleeding disorders.
- KMTC developed and launched a short course curriculum on these topics and trained a focal team to be trainers.
- KHA also conducted training for patients and parents, identified 29 new haemophilia cases, opened a basic care clinic in Kitui, and held a meeting with the Ministry of Health (MOH) to review policies and legislation.
- KHA also celebrated World Haemophilia Day in two regions and held a meeting with the Non-Communicable Disease Alliance of Kenya (NCDAK) to discuss partnership and collaboration.
- KHA facilitated the training of two pharmacists and two physiotherapists from East Africa in haemophilia comprehensive care centres.

- KHA held a meeting with 12 key stakeholders together with the MOH on 7 June 2024 to review policies and legislation. The team agreed to have a follow up meeting as MOH guides the policies that are not being regulated.
- KHA training for 120 people with haemophilia and parents:
  - o 30 people with haemophilia and parents in coast region
  - o 90 people with haemophilia and parents in the central region.
- 29 newly diagnosed haemophilia patients have been identified (19 HA and 10 HB).

#### **Rwanda**

- Formed a Medical Advisory Committee to provide guidance, advice and representation on medical activities.
- MOH approved and published the Haemophilia Treatment Guidelines.
- Integrated haemophilia into the non-communicable diseases programmes of the Rwanda Biomedical Center (RBC).
- Developed a National Patient Registry to collect and manage data on haemophilia patients.
- Raised awareness on World Haemophilia Day through the Rwanda Broadcasting Agency and a local radio station.
- Two-day workshop in Kampala, Uganda involving Medical Advisory Committee, Youth and Parent representatives, and counterparts from Kenya and Tanzania.
- Trained a physiotherapist in Kenya to provide rehabilitation services for haemophilia patients.

#### Tanzania

- Launching phase II project.
- Site assessment of new haemophilia clinics which are Mara Regional Referral Hospital (RRH), Kagera RRH, Tabora RRH, Manyara RRH, Tanga RRH, Mnazi Mmmoja Referral Hospital and Rukwa RRH.
- Commemorated World Haemophilia Day with participation of Director of Medical Services of Ministry of Health Tanzania, NCD Director MOH, and other dignitaries, health care providers, patients, guardians, media etc.
- Trained 50 health care providers during the Medical Advisory Committee. 15 received training on usage of POCUS, 1 at Kenya, 34 received training during MAC induction and Zoom meeting prepared by HCPs who are received training abroad.
- 24 new patients diagnosed whereby 10 were from Muhimbili National Hospital, 6 from Mnazi Mmoja Referral Hospital (Zanzibar), 5 from Mbeya RRH, 3 from KCMC. Patients were diagnosed through family tree tracing. The total number of diagnosed patients is now 362.
- First Phase 2 Medical Advisory Committee Induction during a celebration of World Haemophilia Day.
- Trained 61 patients and 54 parents during World Haemophilia Day, and 15 patients and care givers during NNHF visit to Zanzibar.
- Handover of Point of Care Ultrasound Machine (POCUS) at Muhimbili National Hospital.
- First Board meeting of Haemophilia Society of Tanzania induction.

### **Uganda**

- The Haemophilia Foundation of Uganda (HFU) team met with NNHF delegation, Ministry of Health officials including the Minister of Health, and the blood bank to discuss improved partnerships and policy gaps. In this meeting the MOH committed to allocate budget for better diagnosis.
- HFU organised World Haemophilia Day with paramedical training school to increase awareness.
- HFU trained gynaecologists and midwives in partnership with their associations.
- HFU conducted basic coagulation training for laboratory staff.
- HFU advocated for improved care with Vice President and legislators on International Day of Nurses.
- Committee formed to support treatment guideline development through MOH.
- Leadership training for youths conducted to involve them in case tracing and advocacy.

• Improve haemophilia diagnosis and epidemiological data in Mali

- Establish basic and emergency care for people with haemophilia living in conflictaffected regions
- Strengthen multidisciplinary care team in Bamako and initiate decentralization in Segou and Sikasso regions
- Improve quality of life of people with haemophilia living with joint disabilities through physiotherapy
- Increase awareness and knowledge of general public and authorities on haemophilia

- Organisation of an intensive awareness-raising activity event involving over 80 people (journalists, patients and their families). This led to the production of 24 press articles, 18 audios and 16 videos, the immediate result of which was the diagnosis of 16 people with haemophilia.
- 2 nurses are currently benefiting from an in-depth training programme in CNTS in Dakar, Senegal.
- Organisation of an awareness and advocacy dinner for World Haemophilia Day which gathered 118 people (people with haemophilia and family members, opinion leaders, government, professional media).
- Training of 13 physiotherapists in Bamako to improve joint management and care.

#### **Objectives**

 Improve diagnostic capacity in 7 comprehensive haemophilia treatment centres in Nigeria

- Develop and strengthen comprehensive care in the management of haemophilia in Nigeria
- Improve treatment regimens at the 7 comprehensive haemophilia treatment centres
- Raise awareness about haemophilia and ensure strategic advocacy efforts

- Upgrade of four laboratories: Four laboratories in four centres, namely University of Benin Teaching Hospital (UBTH), the Federal Teaching Hospital Gombe (GFTH), the University College Hospital Ibadan (UCH), and the University of Nigeria Teaching Hospital (UNTH), were upgraded with new equipment and training of lab technicians.
- 2-day virtual nursing training on family tree tracing conducted in February 2024, with 10 nurses participating and benefiting from the experiences of Kenya.
- Workshop/training on laboratory diagnosis of haemophilia for laboratory scientists and doctors took place in April 2024 in Abuja, Nigeria, with 21 participants, including the centre coordinators.
- Guidebook for lab technologists diagnosing haemophilia locally was developed, in addition to the Standard Operating Procedures for centres. These are expected to be launched at the Nigerian Society for Haematology and Blood Transfusion (NSHBT) congress in August 2024.

### **Objectives**

• Develop medical competencies on haemophilia, training more than 100 primary healthcare professionals

• Strengthen haemophilia diagnosis in Brazzaville and initiate decentralisation to Pointe-Noire, increasing the diagnosis rate from 18% to 22% by the end of 2023

• Improve people with haemophilia's knowledge on the condition

• Strengthen haemophilia awareness and advocacy in the country

#### **Achievements**

- Diagnosis of haemophilia A and B has been decentralised to Pointe-Noire, more than 500 km away from the capital Brazzaville. People with haemophilia living in the region are now saving more than 16 hours (for a return journey) to get diagnosed.
- Established 3 basic haemophilia care centres in Pointe-Noire, Nkayi and Dolisie through increased haemophilia knowledge of 124 healthcare professionals including 7 haematologists, 27 doctors, 28 nurses and 17 lab technicians leading to better recognition of the clinical signs of haemophilia as well as the referral of potential cases to the regional reference centres.
- Awareness raising activities along with capacity building of healthcare professionals led to 22 new people with haemophilia being diagnosed, successfully reaching the target diagnosis rate of 22%.
- Through advocacy and awareness raising efforts during the project, the interest of health authorities already engaged in combating sickle cell disease has steadily increased, demonstrated by their participation in haemophilia-related activities. In 2023 haemophilia, alongside sickle cell disease, was included as a genetic blood disorder in the Non-Communicable-Disease (NCD) strategic plan 2023-2024.
- The partner's next advocacy goal is to obtain the establishment of a subsection within the NCD programme specifically for bleeding disorders.

- Strategy workshop between Hemophilia Federation (India), the National Thalassemia Welfare Society and the National Alliance of Sickle Cell Organizations, discussing how to pilot an integrated awareness raising and care model in two selected states.
- Four regional advocacy training workshops conducted with Hemophilia Federation (India), where a total of 170 participants received training in advocacy and developed action plans tailored to their respective states.
- Representatives from Hemophilia Federation (India) met with the National Health
  Mission state officials to discuss future collaborations and policymaking between the
  patient organisation and state authorities in four states: Rajasthan, Kerala, Maharashtra
  and Telangana.
- Four states (Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, West Bengal and Karnataka) successfully advocated for increased budget allocation for haemophilia. Additionally, Maharashtra state government has instructed to have treatment available in all district hospitals of the state, increasing from 9 to 36 haemophilia treatment centres.

- In May, the project team celebrated World Haemophilia Day at Songklanagarind Hospital with 43 people with haemophilia and family members. There were sessions on treatment and self-care as well as the possibility to exchange and share learnings.



In February, the team from SickKids Canada led a point-of-care ultrasound training for healthcare professionals across Thailand.

 Strengthen haemophilia care in Srinagarind Hospital to become a training hub for Northeast Thailand


- Standardise haemophilia care in Northeast Thailand focusing on strengthening 6
   Haemophilia Treatment Centres in Chaiyaphum, Kalasin, Sisaket, Udonthani, Sakon Nakhon and Khon Kaen
- Increase awareness amongst healthcare professionals in district hospitals, enabling them to refer for diagnosis and provide emergency care
- Educate people with haemophilia and their family members on self-infusion and MSK care
- Establish a specialist MSK trainers team in the Northeast focusing on ultrasound in haemophilia care as started in the NNHF Thailand 3 project.

- In January, a training for healthcare professionals was organised in Chaiyaphum together with the support of Prof Nongnuch Sirachainan from Ramathibodi Hospital in Bangkok.
- The core project team joined the training on point-of-care-ultrasound in Bangkok in February. The training was led by the Canadian team from SickKids. The radiologist will attend an in-depth training in Canada later in the year.
- In May, a training session was held for nurses and the emergency personnel from Srinagarind hospital.

## **Objectives**

• Conduct a range of consultation activities to identify the most important skills and competencies required to be developed through the programme

- Develop a high quality, well tested virtual training programme that covers each of the identified needs
- Based on the content developed through objective 2, develop learning pathways (with multiple options customisable by learner groups) and delivery models (e.g. fully remote versus blended learning) to optimise learning and experience for potential participants
- Develop monitoring, evaluation and learning tools and framework to track progress and guide changes to the programme in the long-run
- Launch virtual programme with participants form the NNHF partner network

- A second cohort of participants was held from February April 2024, with participants from 14 countries.
- Based on feedback and monitoring framework, an evaluation of the programme is now underway that will lead to recommendations for the refinement of the next proposed phase of the programme.
